

Ms. Charlotte A. Moran was a French professor in the Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures at Hood from 1966 to 1989. From 1982 to 1989 she was, in alternative years, coordinator of Hood's On-Campus Office of the *Junior Year at Strasbourg University*. She also served on nearly all faculty committees at the college.

Ms. Charlotte A. Moran, died July 28, 2000 at Frederick Memorial Hospital. She was 64.



## Nora Strejilevich

Nora Strejilevich is a writer and professor of Latin American Literature who survived State Terror in her country, Argentina, in 1977. Her testimonial novel *Una sola muerte numerosa* was translated into English in 2002 as *A Single, Numeberless Death*. Her book length essay *El arte de no olvidar: literatura testimonial en Chile, Argentina y Uruguay*//The Art of Not Forgetting: Testimonial Literature in Chile, Argentina, and Uruguay (2006) is the outcome of her extensive research on Testimony. Strejilevich's work in progress is a book length manuscript: *The Testimonial Space*. She has published several articles on the subject, and has been a guest speaker at various universities in the United states, Latin America and Europe.

She has been a Research Associate in the Five Colleges Women Studies Research Center, in Massachusetts (2007), and a Fulbright Fellow at Universidad de Chile (2010). She is currently doing research on human rights at the Center for the Study of Genocide (Universidad Tres de Febrero, Buenos Aires, Argentina).
